




A Zeppelin bombed the quarters at 16? Hervey St on 25th April 1916

'Whitsun 1921 Douglas Brown arrived in Lowestoft early because of the uncertainty of the train service. He strolled along the sea front but was soon recognised and persuaded to preach at the Salvation Army open-air meeting. A large crowd gathered and Mr Brown had the double joy of preaching the gospel and seeing a number of souls come to faith in Christ. At about nine o'clock he went round to the Salvation Army Citadel where he preached again and souls were saved. Douglas subsequently told of a girl who had been converted on the sands that afternoon and who had gone home and testified to her new found faith. Her parents laughed at her but her sister had said, 'if there is a service anywhere tonight, I'll go with you.' 'Yes, there is' the convert said, 'but it is at the Salvation Army Citadel.' 'I don't care where it is, I'll go,' said the sister. She went to the meeting and was converted.'

(Report in Lowestoft Journal Feb 1923)

OFFICER'S FOURTEEN DAYS IN LEWES PRISON

The visit of Commandant Waters (Norwich I. Commanding Officer) to Lowestoft Citadel, Beach Road on Thursday night attracted over 450 people to hear his sensational lecture on '14 days in Lewes Prison'. The lecturer revealed to the audience his crime, which was that of preaching on Denmark Place, Hastings, upon which spot the Salvation Army had held services for 40 years. Several officers served a term of imprisonment, of whom he was one.

GIPSY NELL'S VISIT (February 17th to 21st 1923)

Gipsy Nell, a singularly attractive Salvation Army Envoy, originally of the Romany Gipsy tribe has just concluded an eight days' campaign with the two local corps of the Salvation Army. Upwards of 3,000 people have listened to her wonderful history and thrilling life story.

Seldom has the citadel in Beach Road been uncomfortably packed as on Monday night, when councillor Turrell (supported by Councillor Rushmere) presided. The first scene was 'the dying gipsy boy', the impression of which was greatly enhanced by the platform being arranged as a gipsy encampment and a number of local 'gipsies' attired in gipsy costume sitting round the camp tent and fire. Mrs Huke sang effectively the S.A. song, 'Into a tent where a gipsy boy lay,' and 'Nell' had the dying boy on her knee. As the meeting continued many were in tears. On Tuesday night, at the Church Institute, Rock Estate, when the Rev. h. Martin presided, the hall was crowded to excess, many having to stand. The encampment was again provided. Adjutant Weaver gave the Bible reading and Mrs Adjutant Weaver effectively sang 'Some day the silver cord will break'.

BAND AND SONGSTERS

The Citadel band and Songsters are continuing their musical tour to the various churches of Lowestoft. On Thursday evening a festival was given in Tonning-st. Weslyan Church. At this Councillor R. J. Latten presided supported by various friends of the Army. The programme was varied, and afforded a capital opportunity for the band (including the Young People's) to

demonstrate their ability.-on Thursday evening March 1st, the Band of (sic) Songsters will give another festival of music, in the High Street Wesley Hall, at 7.45, with Mrs S. Bashett in the chair. The score of items to be presented will include two action songs by 'the Sunbeams', the first such troops to be inaugurated in either Norfolk or Suffolk.

10th/11th March 1923.The Salvation Army in Lowestoft is very active in efforts to make for betterment, combined with musical and educative recreation.

On Sunday Brigadier Read gave a lecture at the Citadel in Beach-rd. There was a large audience and many hearts were touched by the intensely human stories which he related regarding the Colonial Boys who came under his care while he was at the Southampton Row Hostel during the war. The Deputy-Mayor (Mr Selwn Humphery) presided and expressed his pleasure at seeing the Army's Sunday School being extended. He was supported by Councillor H Savage. In the evening the Citadel was crowded.

This weekend (March 10th and 11th) Major Bancroft of London, Chief Organiser of the S. A. Scout Movement and Young Men's Counsellor will visit the Citadel, Beach-rd. The second and third Boys Brigade Companies, together with the S. A. Scouts will give a Gymnasium, Ambulance, and Signalling Display.

For Saturday evening commencing 8p.m., and on Sunday at 11p.m., a special parade of Young People has been arranged. Staff Captain Patch (Norwich Headquarters) the Divisional Organise of the Girl Guards will be present.

FIRST CEREMONY IN THE CITADEL

(Lowestoft Journal 1923)

1923 A short time ago Lowestoft Citadel was licensed for marriages and the first one took place on Saturday. The alteration is greatly appreciated as Salvationists can now be united in their own place. The happy couple were Arthur Charles Huke of 82 Crown St and Miss Edith Florence Woodward of 71 Norwich Road. There was quite a large attendance and included a number of relatives and friends from Norwich and London. Both bride and bridegroom are active Salvation Army workers, the bridegroom being particularly in the scout movement as a leader, while the bride is an acquisition to the vocal side of the Army's work and is the young peoples songster leader. Her parents have been Salvationists for over a quarter of a century and have achieved considerable fame as a family of vocalists.

The ceremony was impressively performed by Adjutant J. Weaver. During the service the hymns 'Guide me O Thou Great Jehovah' and 'Precious Name' were sung while the solo 'At Peace with God' was rendered by the bride and the quartette (sic). 'The Lord is my Shepherd' was sung by the bride, the bridegroom and the bride's father and sister, an original and pleasing diversion from the ordinary. Miss R. Rackham was at the organ. The bridesmaids were Misses Ruth and Naomi Woodford and Miss Edna Huke.

After the ceremony there was a reception in the Young People's Hall and about 50 sat down to the wedding banquet. Amongst the large number of presents were those from the bridegroom's workmates, the junior workers of the Salvation Army, and the Junior Songsters.

==== Lowestoft I Band at Fakenham C.O. accompanied Band under special circumstances. A real good week end in my opinion.

In 1935 Gipsy Smith held a mission in Lowestoft during the herring season when the Scottish fisherman were in the town. This included meetings at beach open-airs and in the Citadel. His preaching and singing there were remembered for many years. (There is no mention of this visit in the Corps History Book)





Rodney "Gipsy" Smith MBE(31 March 1860- 4 August 1947) conducted evangelistic campaigns for over 70 years.

(Born in a gypsy tent six miles northeast of London, at Epping Forest Smith received no education. The family made a living selling baskets, tinware, and clothespegs. His father, Cornelius, and his mother, Mary (Polly) Welch, provided a home that was happy in the gypsy wagon. Smith was a child when his mother died from smallpox. The Smith children numbered four girls and two boys (Rodney was the fourth child).

Cornelius was in and out of prison for various offences. There, he heard the gospel from a prison chaplain; later, he and his brothers were converted at a mission meeting. From 1873 on, "The Converted Gypsies" were involved in numerous evangelistic efforts

Conversion

Smith was converted at sixteen. He taught himself to read and write and began to practice preaching. He would sing hymns to the people he met and was known as "the singing gypsy boy." He was married on 17 December 1879 to Annie E. Pennock, one of his converts.

At a convention at the Christian Mission (later to become The Salvation Army) William Booth realized the potential in young Smith. On 25 June 1877, he accepted Booth's invitation to be an evangelist with and for the Mission. For six years (1877-1882), he served on street corners and mission halls.

'Gipsy' Smith as a Captain in the Salvation Army

Rodney and Annie served in several assignments and saw membership rise to hundreds, then a thousand. By June 1882, great crowds were coming and the work was growing. His eight appointments with the Salvation Army had produced 23,000 decisions and his crowds were anywhere up to 1,500.

He travelled extensively around the world on evangelistic crusades, drawing crowds numbering in the hundreds of thousands throughout his life. Sometimes he would interrupt his sermon and burst into song. It is said that he never had a meeting without conversions.

During World War 1 he ministered to the British troops in France, often visiting the front lines. As a result of this he was awarded the MBE

Gipsy Smith's wife, Annie, died in 1937 at the age of 79. He died on the 4th August 1948. So ends the life of one who once said, "I didn't go through your colleges and seminaries. They wouldn't have me...but I have been to the feet of Jesus where the only true scholarship is learned."}


